



- Children become explorers.












### What does learning through play look like?

- Your child will get messy!
















### **Reading and Writing**

- All our reading and writing is taught through a phonics scheme called Read Write Inc.
- Read Write Inc. encourages children to know all their single sounds first (phonemes) and then moves on to blending the sounds to support reading.
- In September, your child will be bringing home a library book to share with you.
- Once they have learnt their sounds and are beginning to blend some simple words, they will be given a reading book from the reading scheme alongside some high frequency words to take home.

#### **Reception Curriculum Overview** Spring Term

Superheroes and Far, Far Away Here are some of the books that we will be reading in the Spring Term with your child.

#### MARK MAKING AND MEANING

- In the Spring term children will be developing their mark making and reading skills through:
- Reviewing set 1 sounds and focusing on special Teach 'Fred in Head' to help when reading. Lots of opportunities for writing and mark making -using tricky words in writing, finger spaces and writing
- left to right and understanding what a sentence is full stops and capital letters.
- Writing simple captions and sentences based on stories read in class.
- Exploring rhyme in stories that are read in class.

#### MY MARVELLOUS WORLD

- In the Spring term children will be developing their understanding of the world around them through:
- Learning about Winter · Artic Animals - what animals live in the cold?
- Where is the artic? Looking at maps and understanding where different countries/continents
- . Ice how is it made and what happens when it melts?
- Junk modelling Opportunities for music making – different sounds
- instruments can make. · Sing songs with others (assemblies and in class)
- Spring new life and growing.

- In the Spring term children will be developing their fine and gross motor skills through: Daily funky finger provision to help support

- Movement of Body parts
- Core exercises

#### MAKING CONVERSATION

- In the Spring term children will be developing their speaking and listening skills through:
- · Circle times children learning how to take turns to talk and share ideas
- During story time begin to ask children to express a point of view - did they like the story? Why?
- Extending children's spoken sentences using words like because.
- Exploring new words and what they mean together
   Providing opportunities to respond to what they see
- and hear.







- Matching numerals to amounts counted and subitised Ordering numbers to 5
- Focus on the composition of 5 and identify missing
- parts.
   Focus on equal and unequal groups and being able to
- say when they are the same or different.

  Understanding that numbers are made up of groups of
- numbers 7 as 2 groups, with a focus on '5 and a bit'
- Practise subitising within 6 Exploring doubles of numbers
- Sorting odd and even numbers by looking at their tops . Count larger amounts and focus on strategies for counting.
- . Learning about how to use a 10 frame.
- Exploring shapes and their properties.













### Tapestry – Online Learning Journals

- An Online Learning Journal System
- EYFS Staff record children's learning and progression using iPads
- Parents can view their child's journal on mobile devices, tablets and on home computers at any time!
- Parents can comment on observations or even add their own!
- Parents can only view observations of their child (or with permission group/class observations)
- You will receive a notification that a new observation has been added and you will be able to view it.

### Why do we use Tapestry?

To enhance two-way communication between us (EYFS Team) and you (parents/carers)



As you will be increasingly more aware of your child's learning and progress in school you will have greater opportunities to extend learning at home.

We can upload photographs and videos of what your child enjoys doing in school.


Children's learning and progress can be shared easily with working parents and extended family members (including those living overseas).


