British Science Week is a national celebration of science, technology, engineering and maths that takes place across the UK each March. Throughout the week, the children have been exploring the exciting world of science through a range of investigations and hands-on activities. They have been asking questions, testing ideas and thinking like scientists as they discover how science helps us understand the world around us.

British Science Week is a wonderful opportunity to spark curiosity and encourage children to ask "why?", "how?" and "what if?". We have loved seeing the children's enthusiasm for exploring, investigating and discovering new things.

Children are also invited to take part in the British Science Week poster competition, and entries can be brought into school by Monday 16th March.

BRITISH SCIENCE WEEK POSTER COMPETITION


What are children and young people's visions for a good future?

Instructions
Introduce the poster competition theme using the following questions:

- What makes children's lives positive? What will a positive childhood look like in the future for children your age?
- What do children in other countries around the world enjoy? How is this the same or different to what makes your life positive?

Make your poster
Once children have had the opportunity to explore the questions and collect their thoughts, it's time for them to respond by creating their own poster to present their ideas. Posters must be A4 or A3 in size and you'll need to be able to supply a 2D image of them (e.g. photos, jpeg or PDF file) so they can be sent to us online for judging. Children can use pop-up pictures, pull out tabs or materials such as pencils, paints, crayons, collage and paper to create their posters. Digitally created posters are also allowed. Shortlisted posters are often shared publicly, so please don't include any personally identifiable information such as names or photos of real people.


Send us your posters

Our Value for this half term is Forgiveness...



In Collective Worship this week, the children explored the importance of forgiveness and resolving disagreements quickly. We looked at the story of the Sydney Opera House and its architect, Jørn Utzon. Although he designed one of the most famous buildings in the world, disagreements during its construction meant he never saw the finished building.

This reminded us how arguments can grow if they are not resolved. We reflected on the Bible verse from Ephesians 4:26, which encourages us not to let anger last too long, and thought about how saying sorry and forgiving others can help mend friendships. We also linked this to our school rules by thinking about being ready to admit when we are wrong, respectful when listening and apologising, and safe by resolving problems kindly.
